POLICE BLOTTER-July 2017

On July 4, police responded to a domestic disturbance in which a resident's intoxicated boyfriend forced his way into her residence. The resident stated that her boyfriend was threatening to kill her, so she sprayed him with pepper spray while defending herself. The boyfriend was arrested and faces several charges related to the incident.

On July 7, a resident reported receiving several unwanted text messages from an abusive ex-boyfriend, despite her insisting he stop contacting her. The ex-boyfriend now faces several charges of telecommunications harassment and menacing by stalking.

On July 10, a fuel card was reported missing from a vehicle. The card had not been used since the time of its disappearance.

On July 13, police investigated a hit-skip accident. A driver stated she was waiting at a traffic light when she was hit from behind. She stated the other driver then turned around and left in the opposite direction. There was moderate damage to her vehicle.

On July 19, police responded to a three-car accident. Vehicles were waiting at a traffic light when the last vehicle was struck from behind. The impact caused that vehicle to hit the one in front of it. The at fault driver was cited for failing to maintain assured clear distance ahead.

On July 20, a resident reported receiving several items from a FedEx delivery that he did not order. He stated that his credit card was used to place the orders. The resident cancelled his credit card and returned the items that had been shipped. It is believed that whoever ordered the items was going to steal them from the porch at the time of delivery.

On July 24, a former resident reported that his father had made threats to him while he was there to retrieve property. The incident was filmed, but no threats to the person's safety were made.

On July 28, a resident reported being contacted by a credit bureau concerning an overdrawn bank account. The resident claimed she had never held an account at the bank in question. Police contacted the bank to get information on behalf of the resident to file a fraud report, and learned that there were several other victims of the same scam.

On July 28, a resident reported damage to the tire and fender of his vehicle, which was parked in front of his house. There was no known cause for the damage.
