Water Meter Basics

Water meters are easily read by the homeowner. Perhaps you wish to monitor your consumption out of curiosity or because you suspect you have a water leak.

Electricity meters and water meters both meter large units of consumption. South Central Power bills customers in Kilowatts (the energy it takes to burn a 100-watt lightbulb for 10 hours). The Village bills water and sewer customers in thousands of gallons.

That means that even if you use the same gallons of water every month, you will occasionally get a higher bill. For example, if you use 2300 gallons each month, you would receive a bill for 2,000 each month for 3 months. Although your total consumption for those 3 months is 6,900 gallons of water, you are only billed for 6,000 gallons. But the fourth month you would receive a bill for 3,000 gallons. After 4 months you have paid for 9,000 gallons and have consumed 9,200.
